Public Hearings

Professional Group: Request to amend the new Currituck County Unified Development Ordinance, Chapter 4, Section 4.2.5 Industrial Uses to allow expansions of existing mining operations.

Ben Woody, Planning Director, reviewed the request.

PB 12-15
UDO AMENDMENT REQUEST**

An amendment to Chapter 4 Use Standards, to allow expansions of existing mining operations.

BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Commissioners of the County of Currituck, North Carolina that the Unified Development Ordinance of the County of Currituck be amended as follows:

Item 1: That Section 4.2.5. Industrial Uses is amended by deleting the strikethrough and adding the underlined text:

A. Extractive Industry

Extractive industry uses shall receive and maintain a State of North Carolina mining permit and comply with the following standards:

(1) General

- (a) Any mine activity affecting more than one acre (including excavation, area where overburden is placed, area used processing or treatment and settling ponds, access roads, etc.) shall be subject to these regulations and require a use permit.
- (b) All State permits and applications for State permits associated with the mining activity, including permit modifications, shall be filed with the Planning Department by the applicant.

(2) Size

No more than 30 percent of the total site shall be excavated at any given time during the mining operation and after completion except as otherwise provided in this section.

(3) Setbacks

- (a) No activities associated with the mine, including but not limited to excavation activities, vehicular access (except for driveways providing access to the site) and detention ponds shall be located within 100 feet of any property line and 300 feet of any residence, school, religious institution, hospital, commercial or industrial building, public road, or cemetery.
- (b) Setbacks may be reduced by 50 percent when there is a complete visual screen at least six feet in height and an intermittent visual screen to a height of at least 20 feet between the mining activity and the adjoining use. Further, the Board of Commissioners may reduce non-modified setbacks by 50 percent when the mining activity adjoins a vacant parcel or farmland.

(4) Height

Mined materials shall not be stored in excess of 25 feet in height.

(5) Access

- (a) For operations that generate more than five trips per peak hour, at least 200 feet of continuous pavement shall be required onsite starting at the point the access road intersects with a public street or highway unless such public street is not paved. Acceleration and deceleration lanes shall be required by the county when it determines, subject to input from the North Carolina Department of Transportation, that such lanes will enhance public safety. All access roads should intersect with public streets at right angles, but in no case be less than 60 degrees. All streets and roads utilized to access the mining site shall be maintained free of dust and sediment and shall be properly graded and drained.

- (b) Where two or more accesses to the mining operation exist, traffic shall be routed to the access having the least negative impact on adjoining properties.

(6) Vehicles

All trucks hauling mined materials (i.e. sand, clay, topsoil) shall be covered with a tarpaulin.

(7) Hours of Operation

In no case shall the hours of operation be beyond dawn to dusk, nor shall mining activity occur on Sundays.

(8) Refuse

No bulk waste, hazardous waste, commercial waste, garbage, construction or demolition waste shall be placed on site.

(9) Dewatering

Discharging of water from the mine site shall be permitted subject to obtaining a state permit. The county may take random samples and have the results tested for settleable solids, turbidity, and pH at the operators' expense. Such testing shall not exceed six tests per year.

(10) Signage

~~'No Trespassing' signs shall be posted around the site being mined at a minimum distance of 250 feet apart indicating that a mining operation is being conducted on the property. 'No Trespassing' signs indicating that a mining operation is being conducted on the site shall be spaced a minimum of 250 feet apart.~~

(11) Reclamation

Reclamation shall be conducted simultaneously with mining operations. Annual reclamation reports shall be submitted to the Planning Department within ten days of being filed with the State.

(12) Overburden

Overburden to be used for future reclamation shall be placed where it will not be disturbed by normal mining activities and shall be stabilized to reduce wind and water erosion. Use of overburden for earth berms is encouraged to reduce the impact of the mining operation on adjoining properties.

~~**(13) Drainage**~~

~~Drainage patterns shall not be altered so as to cause flooding off-site while the permit is valid and after reclamation.~~

(14) Surrounding Wells

No mining activities shall adversely affect surrounding in use wells. A hydrological report as provided below shall be required and the board may consider that report in adjusting setbacks or imposing other conditions on the applicant. Such conditions shall be designed to avoid adverse impacts on in use well owners, including but not limited to requiring monitoring wells,

additional hydrological studies, or surety to protect in use well owners from loss. Any person owning or operating a mining site in a manner that adversely affects an in use well through contamination or diminution of groundwater shall provide the well owner with a replacement water supply of equal quantity and quality. A rebuttal is permitted that contamination or diminution of water has been caused by the mining activity.

(15) Expansion

An expansion of an existing mining operation shall comply with the following procedures and additional standards:

(a) Procedure

- (i) With approval of the ~~Board of Commissioners~~ Planning Director, additional area within the site can be mined provided previously mined areas are reclaimed with non-contaminated soils to the original ground elevation in accordance with state standards. ~~Setbacks established by these regulations shall be met at all times.~~ All reclaimed land shall be identified on a map recorded in the register of deeds.
- (ii) With the approval of the Planning Director, an expansion of an existing mine operation not to exceed 40 percent of the total site area can be mined.
- (iii) In accordance with Section 2.3.14, the Board of Commissioners can approve an expansion of an existing mine operation not to exceed 50 percent of the total site area.

(b) Additional Standards

- (i) The existing mine has an active use permit and State permit.
- (ii) The existing mine has been in operation for a period of no less than five years.
- (iii) The existing mine has maintained compliance with all applicable state and local permit regulations for the past five years of operation.
- (iv) The cumulative total of the mine's excavation area, including the requested expansion, shall not exceed 50 percent of the total site area. All on-site CAMA and US Army Corps of Engineers designated wetlands and surface waters shall not be included in the total site area calculation.
- (v) All State mining permit modifications shall be obtained prior to any expansion activities being performed.

(16) Expiration

- (a) The use permit shall be valid for a period of ten years from the date it is granted or for a shorter duration as

deemed appropriate by the Board of Commissioners. In the event the property owner desires to continue the mining operation thereafter, he shall again petition the Board of Commissioners for a new permit.

- (b) Discharging without proper state permits will result in initiating procedures to revoke the ~~special~~ use permit.
- (c) ~~If at any time a state agency suspends or revokes any permits it has issued for the mining operation, the revocation or suspension shall cause the use permit to become void until such permit is reinstated by the State.~~

Item 2: The provisions of this Ordinance are severable and if any of its provisions or any sentence, clause, or paragraph or the application thereof to any person or circumstance shall be held unconstitutional or violative of the Laws of the State of North Carolina by any court of competent jurisdiction, the decision of such court shall not affect or impair any of the remaining provisions which can be given effect without the invalid provision or application.

PLANNING BOARD DISCUSSION (8/14/12)

Mr. Klebitz explained what could be done with an excavated mine with the rules for a conservation subdivision. One possibility is that the excavated mine could be reclaimed as a recreational lake as part of the development of a conservation subdivision.

Mr. Kovacs asked about the reclamation plan for the mine.

Mr. Klebitz stated the county requires a reclamation plan be submitted along with the initial mining permit, as well as the state.

PLANNING BOARD ACTION

Mr. Clark moved to approve PB 12-15 as written due to its consistency with the 2006 Land Use Plan and that the request is reasonable and in the public interest and promotes orderly growth and development. Mr. Cartwright seconded the motion. Motion carried unanimously.

Chairman Rorer opened the public hearing. There being no comments, he closed the public hearing.

Commissioner O'Neal moved to approve due to its consistency with the 2006 Land Use Plan and that the request is reasonable and in the public interest and promotes orderly growth and development. To also include that the SUP would run concurrent with the State Permit for existing mines, unless there is a violation. Commissioner Etheridge seconded the motion. Motion carried.

B) Chris Turner, Wildlife Resources Commission to discuss Coyotes in the County

Chris Turner, WRC, District 1, Biologist, reviewed coexisting with coyotes. All 100 counties have coyotes. They can be hunted year round. He also reviewed preventing conflicts with coyotes. If a resident has a problem with a coyote they can contact the NC Wildlife Resources Commission on their web site for more information.

Administrative Reports

A) Cameron Lowe, Extension Director, presentation on Currituck County Rural Center

Cameron Lowe, Extension Director, reviewed the history of the Rural Center site and the amenities at the site for recreation. They are now working on a Cultural Heritage Exhibit for the Rural Center.

Tim Kirkpatrick, Rural Center Director, reviewed the many programs that the site offers.

B) Cameron Lowe, Extension Director, recognizing the Board of Commissioners for their Outstanding Partnership with Cooperative Extension

Cameron Lowe, Extension Director, stated that this award was presented to only 5 counties in the State. Ms. Lowe presented each Commissioner with an award.

Commissioner Etheridge stated that he was proud to have accepted the award on behalf of the Commissioners at the NCACC State Conference.

C) Update on the Department of Planning and Community Development

Ben Woody, Planning Director, reviewed the improvements staff is working on to improve the permitting process. Staff is working to simplify applications, with technology improvements and working with the Albemarle Regional Health Services Department to improve the process for septic tank permits.

Commissioner O'Neal commended the staff on working to improve the Department of Planning and Community Development.

D) Update on the Moyock Small Area Plan

Ben Woody, Planning Director, reviewed the Moyock Small Area Plan and announced there would be a citizen meeting on September 24, 7:00 p.m., at the Moyock Library. Population in Moyock has increased more than any other area in the County, and staff needs citizen participation to determine needs for the area, such as recreation.

Resolution Celebrating the 300th Anniversary of Craven County

Whereas, Craven County was created in 1712 as Craven Precinct, extending into what is now eastern Tennessee; and

Whereas, Craven County was the site of North Carolina's colonial capital, New Bern, and Tryon Palace, which served as the first permanent capitol of North Carolina and home to the family of the royal governor. Tryon Palace was also the site of the first sessions of the general assembly for the State of North Carolina following the revolution and housed the state governors until 1794; and

Whereas, Craven County is home to the first American born Governor of North Carolina, Richard Dobbs Spaight, and the most recent Governor of North Carolina, Beverly Perdue; and

Whereas, the 300th anniversary of Craven County is being celebrated throughout the year with a variety of community generated learning opportunities; and

Whereas, on September 22, 2012, coinciding with the anniversary of the start of the Tuscarora War, Craven County will celebrate its rich and diverse heritage at a countywide event that will acknowledge the vital contributions of all its citizens, cities, towns and hamlets in the county's development.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, the Currituck County Board of Commissioners would like to recognize Craven County's rich heritage on its 300th Anniversary.

Resolution Approving Local Water Supply Plans for the Currituck County Water Systems

WHEREAS, North Carolina General Statute 143-355 (1) requires that each system that provides public water services or plans to provide such services shall, either individually or together with other systems, prepare and submit a Local Water Supply Plan; and

WHEREAS, as required by the statute and in the interests of sound local planning, a Local Water Supply Plan for the Currituck County Water System and the Southern Outer Banks Water System, has been developed and submitted to the Currituck County Board of Commissioners for approval; and

WHEREAS, the Currituck County Board of Commissioners finds that the Local Water Supply Plan is in accordance with the provisions of North Carolina General Statute 143-355 (1) and that it will provide appropriate guidance for the future management of water supplies for the Currituck County Water System and the Southern Outer Banks Water System, as well as useful information to the Department of Environment and Natural Resources for the development of a state water supply plan as required by statute;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the Currituck County Board of Commissioners of the Currituck County Water System and the Southern Outer Banks Water System that the Local Water Supply Plan entitled, the Currituck County Water System and the Southern Outer Banks Water System Local Water Supply Plans dated 2007, is hereby approved and shall be submitted to the Department of Environment and Natural Resources, Division of Water Resources; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Currituck County Board of Commissioners intends that this plan shall be revised to reflect changes in relevant data and projections at least once every five years or as otherwise requested by the Department, in accordance with the statute and sound planning practice.

CAPITAL PROJECT ORDINANCE**

BE IT ORDAINED by the Currituck County Board of Commissioners, North Carolina that pursuant to Section 13.2 of Chapter 159 of the General Statutes of North Carolina, the following capital project ordinance is hereby adopted:

SECTION 1. The project authorized is to remove woody debris from Hog Bridge Ditch starting at South Gregory Rd toward Indiantown Creek. Approximately 4000' of canal will be cleared, which was blocked as a result of Hurricane Irene In August 2011.

SECTION 2. The following amounts are appropriated for the project:

SECTION 3. The following revenues are available to complete this project:

SECTION 4. The Finance Director is hereby directed to report, on a quarterly basis, on the financial status of each project element delineated in Section 2 above.

SECTION 5. SPECIAL APPROPRIATIONS AND RESTRICTIONS

The Budget Officer is hereby authorized to transfer appropriations within the fund as contained herein under the following conditions:

- a. He may transfer amounts between object line items within the fund up to One Thousand dollars (\$1,000).

SECTION 6. CONTRACTUAL OBLIGATIONS

The County Manager is hereby authorized to execute contractual documents under the following conditions:

- a. He may execute contracts for construction or repair projects which do not require formal competitive bid procedures.
- b. He may execute contracts for (1) purchases of apparatus, supplies, and

materials, or equipment which are within the budgeted departmental appropriations; (2) leases of personal property for a duration of one year or less and within budgeted departmental appropriations; and (3) services which are within budgeted departmental appropriations.

- c. He may execute contracts, as the lessor or lessee of real property, which are of a duration of one year or less which are within the budgeted departmental appropriations.
